

Without Seeing We Believe

We find ourselves in the glorious season of Easter! The beauty of the Resurrection is once again made real for us through our celebration of Easter. The readings for this season all speak about the resurrection experiences of not only the disciples but also of the early



Christian Communities. As we listen to the stories we should be able to see how relevant they are even for this day. There are many ways that we are able to relate to the experiences of those early followers and apply the grace that the risen Lord brings to our lives today.

If you notice the readings for the season of Easter come from the New Testament. There are testimonies from those early followers of Jesus. We hear of their joys as well as their struggles. A common theme that we can find throughout these readings deals with the rapid growth of the early church. In our first reading this week Luke summarizes the situation, character and activities of this church. We are told that the people were "of one heart and mind." Unity is definitely a gift that they celebrated. They held everything in common and shared all that they had with those who were in need. It is good to take this first reading and slowly go over it line by line and feel the joy that was present among the people. We would certainly do well to compare their experiences with our own in the communities we live in

St. Peter in the second reading makes reference to some of the trials that these early Christians had to endure. He compares Rome to Babylon as it was experienced in the Old Testament. Although at the time of Jesus Babylon was no longer a great power, but only a tiny, unimportant place, the name certainly refers to Rome whose authority was beyond question throughout the world known to the author. By the time this letter was written the government had already been persecuting the Christians and there was much suffering and fear. Here, the people are reminded of the purpose of their journey through life, and that all will certainly come to fruition in the risen Lord.

The Gospel presents us with the real question for the week: can we believe without seeing? This has always been the primal question with all believers. Thomas becomes the great teacher for us through his own experience. He simply could not believe what was being said about Jesus, he needed to see for himself, he needed concrete proof

When Thomas is confronted with the Risen Lord, Rather than touch Jesus, he utters a profound profession of faith. Clearly the gospel is about seeing, but another, deeper layer is gradually unfolded. Thomas' seeing is concerned with the physical presence of the risen Christ and his wounds. However, Jesus leads the disciples into the deeper meaning of seeing: today we "see" Jesus through our being faithful to the mission he gives us. What does it mean to believe in the resurrection of Jesus? Like Thomas, many of us struggle with belief. Too often, however, our struggle is similar to Thomas': we want tangible evidence. The twist of the gospel lies in the kind of tangible evidence we are given: the tangible presence of the risen Jesus is found in our being sent to continue the mission of Jesus. The tangible evidence of the presence of the risen Jesus is found in receiving the Holy Spirit so we can do the good works of faithful disciples. Believing in the risen Jesus means more than accepting the fact of his resurrection; it means doing as Jesus does. We experience this Risen Lord when we offer to others "peace, forgiveness and new life."
