Calming the Stormy Waters of Life

Of all the emotions we deal with in life, fear is the one that is mentioned most frequently in the scriptures. As people, we are all afraid of something, it is the most basic of all human emotions. Fear paralyzes us in more ways than we can even imagine, and most of



our fears are taught; some are instinctive. Do you ever just sit down and think about what you are afraid of in life? Facing new challenges can induce fear, as it so often does in the scriptures.

The readings in our liturgy today invite all of us to come into Christ's presence even when the storms rage and it's hardest to believe. So, how do we deal with all of these fears that plague our lives? We are told throughout the scriptures that only by trusting in Gods loving presence can we overcome even our deepest fears. It becomes our task in life to tune into God's voice. Like Elijah, often we find God where we least expect. God always speaks to our hearts, and in this confusing world that we live in sometimes like Elijah, we need to go into a quiet cave just to hear that voice. This must be the first step we take in trying to learn more about God's presence in life.

Once we hear God speaking to us, we need to learn how to trust in what God might be saying. It is so hard to trust when we don't know what is going to happen. We all would love to see life turn out the way we want it to but that is not the case. People don't always react how we would like them to, they don't always behave how we wish they would. How many times have we heard people lament over the fact that their children don't go to church anymore? We all need to trust that in some point in their lives God will speak to their heart and they will be back. But rather than trust in God taking care of things, we feel that it is our responsibility or that in some way we have failed.

In the gospel this week we can clearly see that the disciples did not trust in who Jesus was. They allowed their own fear to overcome their need to trust. The scenario that Matthew gives us this week is so much like life. We often feel like the disciples trapped in a boat full of fear not knowing what to do. It is

the fear that makes us feel powerless. Only when we realize that when we trust in God's love and care, all will be well. Sometimes God will speak to us in the storms of our lives, other times in silence as Elijah discovered. Whenever and however God chooses to speak to us, it is that gentle voice that will make us ready to meet any raging storm.

Sharing our Time and Our Talents

It is hard to believe but here we are already in the third week of August and it certainly won't be long before school starts again. It is during this time of the year that we think about sharing who we are for the greater good. As I look at our parish family I am sometimes overwhelmed at the generosity and goodness of our people. There are so many who give so much of their time to help and be a part of our parish activities. There is however one area of our parish life that that we need to enrich, and that is our Liturgy.

The Liturgy is the very heart of our parish and it is the very purpose of why we exist. Too many times we allow ourselves to get caught up in issues that really don't count for much and they take us away from what is important. The Liturgy is our whole purpose for being and we all should be as active during the liturgy as we possibly can. I have listed below areas that we can use assistance with during our liturgy. If you think that you might be able to lend a hand, please know that your gifts are most welcome.

Greeter: This ministry is simply people at the door greeting people and welcoming them as they come in. Usher: This ministry is open to everyone and it consists of helping people find seating in the church, taking up the collection and getting people to carry the gifts in during the liturgy.

Lector: Proclaiming the word of God is a primary function of the Liturgy. Sharing this with the members of our parish family does enrich our celebrations. This is open to all members of our parish. We are going to start having young people read during the liturgy, so if you are in 7-12 grade, please know we would love to have you serve as a lector.

Eucharistic Minister of Holy Communion: We are all called to bring the presence of Christ to the people in our world. During the Liturgy we have the opportunity to share in this ministry through the distribution of the Holy Eucharist. We also have the opportunity to share the Eucharist with those who are homebound.

Server: To serve at the Altar of Jesus is a true honor and privilege. If you are in third grade or older and wish to be a part of this, you are most welcome.

Washing the Altar Linens: This ministry is a lot easier than one might think. It consists of doing the purificators (the white cloths used to wipe the chalice during distribution of communion) as well as a few towels. You can pick them up any time during the week and return them at your convenience.

Music: The music during our liturgy adds such a touch of elegance. If you are interested in being a cantor, member of choir, if you play an instrument, organ or piano, know we can use your gifts.

I ask that you look at the ways that you might be able to help during the liturgy. In a few weeks you will have the opportunity to sign up for one of these ministries.
