



Breaking down barriers...

Our challenge for this week has to do with breaking down barriers wherever we may find them in life. Isaiah in the first reading alludes to barriers that kept people from worshipping together. Isaiah tells the people as he speaks to us: "Observe what is right, do what



is just..." He further goes on to tell us that the house of God "shall be called a house of prayer for all peoples." Isaiah is expanding the boundaries of the worshipping community of Israel and foreshadows the future "catholic" (universal) mission of the church.

St. Paul in this last chapter of Romans speaks about the delicate issue of the future of Israel. He reminds us that God's call is irrevocable and that God's mercy will make it possible for all to be reconciled with God, and not just a chosen few. Matthew in his presentation this week does not specifically speak or refers to any barriers, but they are certainly implied. Today's selection has Jesus withdrawing to Pagan territory which in of itself breaks down a major barrier dealing with foreigners. This time, the initiative comes neither from Jesus nor from the disciples, but from this brave woman, a foreigner and a pagan, who dared to beg from Jesus deliverance for her daughter. The woman shows a great deal of courage, both as a woman and as a foreigner, to call upon Jesus.

Regardless of who the woman was or where she came from, Jesus recognized what was important, her faith; and grants her request. There were many boundaries around women in the day of Jesus, and we all know that the question of how the Bible deals with the issue of women – their identity and their role in society and in religion – has become a very sensitive one, especially among Catholics.

Any reflection on the place of women in church ministries will generate lively debates. Admittedly, the Bible has been the object of severe criticism for having made its own social prejudices against women. Yet, it has been observed that it is not so much the Bible that should be blamed as the reading we have made of it. For example we have focused so much on male heroes of the Bible (the patriarchs, Moses, David, to mention just a few) that we have left to oblivion women like Sarah, Miriam, Deborah, Hannah and many more. In the New Testament, we have focused so much on the twelve that we have forgotten great believers like Elizabeth, Mary the mother of Jesus, the Samaritan woman, Mary Magdalene, Martha and Mary and the Canaanite woman featured in today's gospel.

Today's texts invite a thoughtful meditation on America's place among other nations; on moral issues around the treatment of women, migrants and exiles; or on similar topics about our shared human community. We must learn from the example of Jesus and be faithful to the Spirit that dwells within us. Like Isaiah tells us: Observe what is right, do what is just!

Int'l Food Festival, Greensburg

Join us for an International Food Festival to support priestly formation in the Philippines Friday, Aug. 25, at 5:30 p.m. at Christ Our Shepherd Center, Greensburg.

Right now, nearly 20 Filipino priests serve as missionaries in parishes throughout the Diocese of Greensburg. Bishop Medil Sacay Aseo, Bishop of Tagum in the Philippines, will be present for the event. In 2018 Bishop Medil Aseo, then, Father Medil Aseo, was serving as Parochial Vicar of St. Mary, Our Lady of Guadalupe Parish, Kittanning, and St. Mary, Mother of God Parish, Yatesboro, when he was appointed by Pope Francis as Bishop.

The festival will celebrate his visit and give thanks for all our international priests, and will raise money to support the priestly formation program in the Diocese of Tagum, which has the largest group of priests serving our Diocese in our International Priests Program.

Tickets are \$75 per person, which include samples of food from Italy, Eastern Europe and the Philippines, plus an entire room of desserts and two drink tickets.
