

God Reveals Only Goodness

Sometimes it is a good thing for us to sit back and think about God's revelations to us. Our world constantly pushes us to become more independent and not have to look to others for help. We strive to become self-sustaining as individuals as well as a country. Today



our liturgy speaks to us about the overwhelming presence of God in our midst. We are reminded that God is the one who sustains us and helps us deal with life and the problems life throws at us. It is this understanding that will ultimately bring us peace in life; we are never alone no matter how "independent" we feel we are. God is always the one who initiates and we respond.

God's generosity encompasses absolutely everything that this world is about. No matter where we live, work or play it is the generosity of God that constantly surrounds us. We are undoubtedly a people blessed beyond words; and yet for a people who have been given so very much, how can we be so negligent in our appreciation or even awareness of God's goodness? Too often in life we pride ourselves in our own accomplishments and even though we admit to having God's help, we still take a lot of the credit. Today's liturgy speaks to us about God's dominion over all the earth. In the first reading Isaiah reminds the people that it is not the power of kings or leaders that matters, it is God's power allowing them to rule and share their gifts. When they forget this and start operating out of their own agendas, God will step in. He gives us a message of hope; letting us know how all powerful and loving God is in life.

In the second reading we find the great thinker Paul reciting a prayer reminding us of the ever presence of God through the gift of Jesus in and among our world. He reminds us of the transcendence and the unpredictability of God's ways. In the gospel for this week, Matthew reminds us just how God reveals the mysteries of life to us. These are things that we cannot learn by ourselves, it is always the power and presence of God revealing divine goodness to us.

When Jesus asks the disciples who people say he was, it was Peter who confesses exactly what was revealed to him by God: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." God is constantly revealing to all of us goodness in life. In fact our own discipleship is a revelation. Only by God's gift is Peter able to make his profession of faith and receive his role of leadership. Just as it was with Peter, we ourselves can recognize Jesus because God has revealed him to us. The good news of the church is that Christ trusts us to proclaim throughout the ages that his identity has been revealed by God. Jesus did not choose only great thinkers or saintly people to steer his church on a right

course and make his name known. He chose ordinary humans who simply open themselves to the capacity to be great believers because they are first great hearers of the revelation. We all need to be more attentive to life and recognize the revelation that is being given to us!
