Thinking small doesn't help!

Did you ever notice how often in life we think small? We concern ourselves with the immediate needs and concerns and often fail to open ourselves to the much bigger picture. During these last few days before Christmas, I am sure that you are all very busy, and isn't it funny how much emphasis we all put



on one day! However, this day simply cannot be captured in just twenty-four hours, even though our planning is. On this last Sunday of Advent we are shown how absolute God's goodness is. Our liturgy presents us with a rich history of the promise that was made to David about his house and the fact that it would last throughout the ages. Even though David did not comprehend what God was speaking about, history certainly unveils the story for us.

Samuel in our first reading shows us a King David who is feeling guilty because he lives in a fine house built of cedar while the Lord lives in a tent. Through Nathan, God promises David that his house will live forever. I am sure that King David was thinking "small" and imagining a house built of brick and mortar having no concept of what forever really meant. This is one of the key passages of the Hebrew Scriptures for it guarantees that a descendant of David would lead the Israelites. We have the hindsight of knowing that God was speaking of a spiritual home, a religious dynasty that exists in the hearts of believers. What we are asked to embrace from this reading is God's presence in the realms of our hearts, and it is our spirit that makes God's reign last forever.

Advent teaches us that it is always God who works marvels in us. It does not depend on our own worth, status, or role in society. As Gabriel tells Mary, it is the power of the Holy Spirit that will make it possible for her to be the mother of the son of God. It is the might of the Most High that will overshadow her and make her the worthy vehicle of God's grace.

We would all do well to recognize that the same Spirit that filled Mary with the miracle of Jesus' birth lives in each of our hearts. The reality of God present in human flesh, transcends a purely earthly kingdom, and yet, we cannot avoid the reality that we live in a world that has been too little changed by that fact. Perhaps that is because we feel we know who Jesus really is; so we sit back and wait for him to save us. Salvation however does not occur in a vacuum. It requires human involvement from all who claim that Jesus is savior.

The whole of Advent, the improbability of Mary being chosen to bear God's son, this Eucharist, all proclaim that we humans do make a difference. They all celebrate the willingness of Mary as well as Jesus to do the will of God and inaugurate his new kingdom. Unless we are equally willing, that kingdom will always remain outside our grasp. Thinking "small" takes care of our immediate needs, it is when we are able to open ourselves up and look at the "big" picture we can become aware of the goodness of God. Like King David, our visions are often limited, but like Mary we must be willing to move beyond our own limitations and open our hearts to the wonder of God by saying yes.
