Stop and Listen

Once again this week the virtues of commitment and hope permeate our Liturgy. Baruch who was a companion and friend of Jeremiah speaks in words filled with hope. He speaks to a people who are living in fear with hope that one day they



will be able to return home. Baruch personifies God as a loving and concerned mother who reminds her children of their wrong doings while at the same time encourages them with words that speak of a future and promise of freedom, and that their journey home will be made easy because of God's love and care. Mountains will be leveled and valleys raised so that they may march on level ground with no hindrances.

St. Paul affirms those who are Baptized and living up to their commitments. Here he reminds us all that we should be grateful to the many people in our churches that faithfully carry on the work of the church by living out of their Baptismal promises. St. Luke in the Gospel introduces us to that mysterious figure we know as John the Baptist. It is interesting that he situates John in history by summarizing who the great leaders of the church were. In so doing, John is no mythical figure, he is rooted in history. Historians believe that John was a member of a strict Jewish sect whose members went through a ritual of washing or immersion into water symbolizing a baptism or bath. Similar to the prophets of the Old Testament, John summarizes all of salvation history for us by telling his audience to *"prepare the way of the Lord..."*

John must have been a magnetic person for his message spread far and wide among the people. He is presented to us as a humble man for he constantly reminds his listeners that *"One greater than I is to come."* His message always points to the promise or fulfillment of the commitment that Jesus would come. History portrays him as a man who stands in contrast to Jesus, being grave and foreboding. Jesus was welcoming and forgiving. You would not invite John to your Christmas party – he would arrive in loincloth and sandals and refuse to share your wine and probably lay a guilt trip on you for having fun. Jesus on the other hand would feel comfortable eating and drinking with you. In fact he performed some of his most forgiving acts around food and drink: different men, different ways of proclaiming God's forgiveness.

Rather than a prolonged waiting, Advent brings us to active listening. Our world is full of sounds and noise and sometimes it can be difficult to hear God's word. We are challenged today to take the real events of our everyday lives – all the suffering and pain, all the anxiety and hopelessness, all the joy and peace and see them as means to recognize the presence of Christ to us. This is what Advent is all about: recognizing the presence of Christ in our lives. We are encouraged to stop our busyness long enough to hear that Word and allow the Word to make straight our paths.

Feast of St. Nicholas

The legend of Santa Claus begins with a real saint, St. Nicholas born in the third century. Known for his generosity to those in need, and his love for children, his feast day is celebrated on December 6. While little **children put out their shoes on December 5** and look for the candies and small gifts left for them to find in the morning, **adults can share candies, chocolates and letters.** Sinter Klass (his Dutch name) is known throughout the world by many names, including Christ Kind or Kris Kringle in Germany, but is always a symbol of joy and sharing.

Christmas Wafers



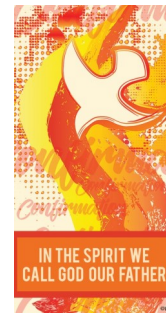
