Listening to God's Voice

This second Sunday of Lent presents us with the familiar story of Abraham prepared to sacrifice his only son. Although this story is hard to understand with Yahweh even asking Abraham to entertain such action, it is layered with deeper meanings that we need to carry with



us in life. It is easy for us to see the parallel of Abraham sacrificing his son with Jesus being offered up by God. In the first scenario it is the love of God which eventually saves Isaac, Abrahams "beloved son." In the second, it is God's vast love that allows his "Beloved Son" to be sacrificed for all people. The common thread that can be clearly seen in both is the allencompassing power of God's love.

Rather than loose our thought on why Yahweh would ever ask such a task from Abraham, we need to focus our attention on the faith that allowed Abraham to hear, let alone follow the voice of God. It was because of his great faith and belief in God's goodness that he was given a promise of a lasting heritage. Sometimes I wonder what would have happened if Abraham ignored God's voice and did not respond to God's request. It was his faith that allowed him to trust in God. It was his faith that gave him the courage to venture forward not knowing how things would turn out.

We can learn an awful lot from the example of faith that Abraham shows us. How well do we even listen to God let alone follow through with action. What a leap of faith it must have been for Abraham to be willing to sacrifice so much. As we look at our lives today we need to ask ourselves how far are we willing to go to respond to God's voice, what are we willing to sacrifice?

From our gospel reading this week we see how the disciples reacted when they heard the voice of God. They wanted to hold onto that moment and not move from the mountain. We all have mystical moments in life when we can feel God's presence, and we too would like to hold onto those moments. We learn from Abraham that we must have faith in God when God speaks to us but that we must also respond; we simply cannot just do nothing. We cannot stay on top of the mountain like the Disciples wanted to. We cannot hold onto God and try to keep God locked up in some remote place. God must be found in the everyday routine of our lives, at the foot of the mountain where we live. It is there that we must "listen to him."

Heifer Project

Just as a reminder, if you wish to make a contribution to purchasing an "ARK" through Heifer International, you can put it in an envelope and drop it in the collection basket. The ARK consists of a collection of animals that will provide an opportunity for people around the world to support not only their families but also help build their communities. To understand what your donations can do, each week I will talk about the animals and how they are used.



Gift of a Buffalo: The Water Buffalo is certainly any farmer's friend! Thai farmers respectfully refer to the water buffalo as "the farmer's friend" because the animal provides the draft power that makes rice cultivation practical, particularly in remote areas. For farmers in Thailand and others throughout Asia, the huge animals

provide high-protein milk for families and organic fertilizer for their farms. One Water Buffalo costs \$250.

In the verdant, rugged mountains of the Philippines, farmer Bagwan and his wife Loge remember the days before Heifer International helped them obtain a water buffalo. "We had to do everything manually, even till our land," he and other barefoot villagers used sharpened sticks to prepare mountain rice paddies for planting. The arduous labor left the villager exhausted, often nursing bruised and bleeding feet. Hand planting produced barely enough rice to love on. "Today our water buffalo has improved the lives and health of our family," he said. Water buffalo allow subsistence-level farmers to harvest four times what they can produce by hand-planting.
