## Love is a Call to Action

Today's liturgy gives us a taste of what love is really all about. St. Paul presents love not as something that we find in advertisements or product endorsements, rather love is seen as an ethical challenge. He speaks to a community that



was sharply divided over the value of gifts. Some felt that they were more blessed than others. Some believed that their gifts were better than everybody else's. What was missing among the people of Corinth was the unifying power that love is about. You can be blessed beyond your wildest dreams but if it is not grounded in love, than it is all for naught. Love must be active. Love is what love does. Love teaches, love forgives, love has no limits, and love never ends. Love must be the criterion against which all gifts are measured. Those who love as Paul tells us what love is and does, love God.

Paul's explanation of love builds up the community and invites people to care for those left out, for those who go astray and prompts generosity among its members. This type of love is very practical and calls for mutual respect for all members of the body of Christ.

Love needs to be at the root of all of our ambitions in life. If not, then we are missing the point. Jeremiah in the first reading shows the people of Israel that God's love must be seen through all of life, the good along with the bad. He talks about a renewal of God's covenant rooted in love. His words were not merely spoken, it was through his life and his suffering that he gave witness to his speech. Prophets often say things to people that they do not want to hear. This is the case with Jeremiah. At times his preaching seems severe, but he tried always to raise the consciousness of the people so that they would understand their betrayal of Yahweh. Throughout his entire ministry he desperately tried to show the people the absolute love that God had for them.

Last week we saw how powerful the spoken word can be. This week we see an example of what that spoken word can really do. Jeremiah is persecuted for speaking the truth. The people did not want to listen, or they simply could not bear to face the truth about how they were living their lives. Jesus, through his words, does exactly the same thing. When he was saying things that the people agreed with he was the great, well - respected-home-town boy. As soon as he pointed to the greater picture and a closer look at reality, they were ready to throw him over a cliff.

We are confronted today with the reality that we will not always like what we hear in God's word. God's word must take us beyond where we are. It is the love found in God's words that encourage us to surrender ourselves and our own small worlds to encompass the larger vision of a world in which God assures that all are met with love and dignity. When God's words make demands on us, we are faced with new ways we must die to ourselves in order to become better disciples. Dorothy Day often quoted from Dostoevsky: "Love in action is a harsh and dreadful thing, compared to love in dreams." We all need to determine how we will put love into action and take it out of our dreams.

### **Blessing of Throats**



Blaise, who had studied philosophy in his youth, was a doctor in Sebaste in Armenia, the city of his birth, who exercised his art with miraculous ability, good-will, and piety. When the bishop of the city died, he was chosen to succeed him, with the acclamation of all the people. His holiness was manifest through many miracles: from all around, people came to him to find cures for their spirit and their body; even wild animals came in herds to receive his blessing.

In 316, Agricola, the governor of Cappadocia and of Lesser Armenia, having arrived in Sebastia at the order of the emperor Licinius to kill the Christians, arrested the bishop. As he was being led to jail, a mother set her only son, choking to death of a fish-bone, at his feet, and the child was cured straight away. Regardless, the governor, unable to make Blaise renounce his faith, beat him with a stick, ripped his flesh with iron combs, and beheaded him.

Each year the Church commemorates the feast of Saint Blaise, Bishop and Martyr celebrated on February 3<sup>rd</sup>. Because St. Blaise is the patron saint for the protection against throat diseases, we will bless throats after Mass on Thursday.
