The Epiphany of the Lord

Today is one of my favorite celebrations in the Church year. For centuries now people have been fascinated with the story of the Magi. Eastern Rite and Orthodox churches celebrate the Epiphany, rather than Christmas as the time of giftgiving in imitation of the Magi bringing



gifts to Jesus. The star, along with the manger, has been the most popular image on Christmas cards.

With all of the mania of Christmas behind us, most people have packed up all of their decorations and put them away for another year, so that we can focus on the revelation of the Incarnate Christ without distraction. And yet for many churchgoers the story of the Magi is all they know of it. Ultimately this feast points to the wonder of God's plan for all people. It deals with life and all of the divisions we are faced with in our world as well as in our hearts.

Through the wisdom of Isaiah we can see that here is a man who is well aware of the perils in life and the struggles of people to attain freedom. For Isaiah as well as for all of the Jewish people of his day, Jerusalem is the center of the world and the focal point of all the hopes and dreams of the Jewish people. He speaks very inclusively about all nations walking by the light of Yahweh. He dreams of how the Jewish people will lead all people to God and share in the blessings of salvation. He is more than anxious to rally the spirit of the Israelites so that they can find hope for a better future. We all need a spokesperson like Isaiah to help us realize our hopes in times of trouble. People all over the world, living in darkness with poverty war and oppression, look for a light to lead them. Isaiah's prophecy is an excellent example which speaks to the hopes of all peoples who follow a star that shines on a better future. We all look for "epiphanies" or revelations for a better world and a deeper faith

Matthew in our Gospel for today reflects on Isaiah's dream to include all people in God's plan of salvation. Like Isaiah, it is the light that guides the Magi to the Christ child. These Magi are not ordinary men. The Greek word "magi" refers to a priestly cast known for their wisdom and ability to interpret dreams and decipher astrological phenomena. The gifts that they brought; gold for a king, frankincense which is a symbol of prayer rising to God and myrrh, a symbol of one who will die, suggests that these men have received a special revelation or epiphany from God as to who the child Jesus was. The Magi's journey symbolizes for us our own human experience, our journeys both physical and spiritual. In celebrating this feast today we all give witness to a universal truth based on the experience of all people and their quest to find God. Their journey reflects our own lives, our own stories, our own gifts which we bring to God.

Salvation is meant for all, if we are willing to follow God's signs of the gift. Although we may not abandon everything in life just to follow a star, the story helps us to recognize that in our daily living God does lead us. We just have to have the faith and insight to recognize that guiding light. If we walk by faith following our own stars in life who knows what might be at the end of our journey.

Epiphany

This weekend, we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany of Our Lord and our feast day. Epiphany celebrates the revelation that Jesus was the Son of God, focusing on this revelation to the



Three Wise Men, His baptism and the wedding feast at Cana. As a holiday, it predates the celebration of Christmas on December 25. Epiphany is also a traditional time of blessing homes. Using blessed chalk, families inscribe the blessing over the doorway to their homes. This year the inscription reads:

20+C+M+B+24

The initials stand for Casper, Melchoir and Balthazar, as well as the Latin phrase "Christus mansionem benedicat," or, "Christ, bless this house.
