Jesus, the Lamb of God

At first glance our readings for this Sunday of Ordinary time seem to reflect in an exact way what we celebrated last week with the Baptism of our Lord. However, there is an important distinction which sets our readings apart from focusing solely on Baptism. The readings



for this week move us to reflect on Jesus' identity and mission. John calls Jesus the "Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world." We know these words from Mass, but what is the real significance of the title?

The sacrifice of animals to remove guilt for wrongs committed was part of the religious landscape of Israel. The sacrifice of the Passover lamb originally belonged to liturgy celebrated in the home. In time, the Passover liturgy and the sacrifice of the lamb formed a part of the annual Passover liturgy of the temple. Part of the significance attached to this liturgy was the removal of the people's sin and guilt accumulated during the preceding year.

John places the crucifixion of Jesus one day before the Passover, the Day of Preparation. It was on this day that the Passover lamb would have been sacrificed in the temple. John wants his readers to think of Jesus as the true Passover sacrifice. He would like his readers to understand Jesus, and not the lamb slaughtered in the temple precincts, as the lamb that takes away the sins of the world.

Our baptismal task is continually to deepen our own understanding of who Jesus is and to make him known, and to deepen our own understanding of our Christian identity as the beloved daughters and sons of God, as the Body of Christ. Like John, we go from not knowing to seeing to testifying. More than likely, we are not called to testify to the Son of God by going out and baptizing or doing great things. We testify to Jesus' identity and carry forth his saving mission by being faithful to the ordinary things in life, by doing God's will. The revelation of Jesus' identity and how he is made known in the world is mediated by the way we die and rise every day.

Thus we also must become more fully the "Lamb of God." This means that like Jesus, we must be willing to die to ourselves for the sake of others. Like John the Baptist, to whom "Jesus came toward," opportunities to die to self, come to us every day. Like John, we simply need to open our eyes to recognize and respond to opportunities to carry forward Jesus' ministry to others. Our own understanding of who Jesus is and our own testimony to Jesus' presence is manifested through the good we do for others.

Baptism of Our Lord

Last week we celebrated the Baptism of Our Lord, an occasion to ponder over our own Baptism and its commitments. Through Baptism we begin a journey of faith, one which does not end until we enter into God's promise of eternal glory. This journey asks us to be responsible members of the Church and calls us all to be ambassadors for Christ, bringing his presence and his love to all the people we meet.

COVID has affected all of life, and not always in a good way. Our Church is still feeling the effects of the pandemic with the low attendance. Sometimes we need to look at what we are doing and far more importantly...why? It is our faith that needs to become our guiding light. It is our faith that can help us deal with the uncertainties of life.

We all know someone who has not come back to Church. As members of Christ's body we all can make an effort to invite people to come back. Sometimes it is just that little reminder that can make a difference. As Baptized men and women we all share in the responsibility to help build a stronger Kingdom of God.
