What is the "Better Part"?

Hospitality is the thread that links our scriptures for today. Traditions of hospitality vary from culture to culture around the world. The altar table, the family table, Abraham's table, and Martha and Mary's table, though different in time and space, need not be different in their effect.



Our scriptures start out with a story from Genesis focusing on the generosity and hospitality of Abraham and his wife Sarah. Abraham is met with three visitors and he spares nothing to make them feel welcome. Little did he know that he was being visited by God, which shows us that the nearness of God is always present. There are no limits to the ways in which God can encounter with our lives.

The Gospel presents us with another situation of hospitality. One in which Jesus finds himself a guest at the home of Martha and Mary. There are a number of social issues in this particular situation that give true meaning to the story. When we understand the rigid social structures of the patriarchal society in which Jesus lived, we can see how absolutely daring it was for Mary to sit at Jesus' feet and give him her undivided attention. Jesus was a rabbi, and there is a verse in the Talmud that states, "It is better to burn the Torah than to teach it to women." Here again we find Jesus turning that world upside-down.

The familiar story of Martha and Mary has been used and misused probably since it was written. Jesus tells Martha: "Mary has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her." What exactly is the better part? Keeping in mind that we are dealing with hospitality, and we need to remember that there is no one way to be hospitable. Hospitality in its deepest sense makes possible a personal encounter of the kind that Mary is having with Jesus. This is the "better part" to which Jesus refers. Hospitality is a genuine welcome of the other, and surrender to the other. It sets up the possibility of hearing the visitor's message: one critical aspect of discipleship is listening. Thus, the better part is listening to Jesus, being attentive to Jesus' presence. Abraham is totally attentive to the three strangers: he greets them and bows down in respect; he extends an invitation to remain a while, and then acts after he has listened to the strangers' reply. In contrast, Martha is "anxious and worried." She loses sight of her guest and gets wrapped up in her task, as well-meaning as that may be. Martha surrendered to anxiety and worry rather than to the presence of her Guest. What is the "better part"? As important as certain aspects of hospitality are, the "better part" is to listen and surrender to the presence of the Lord. Faithful discipleship depends upon these surrendering and listening aspects of hospitality.

In the "busyness" of the average person's everyday life, we must take time to listen to others so that we truly encounter them. This is primary if we disciples are not to lose sight of the one who teaches us, and often teaches us through those to whom we are truly hospitable. Discipleship calls us to be busy about others and to listen and take the other into our heart. The encounter with Jesus is essential for Christian hospitality. Let us hear that well!

Be Ready for God to 'Stop By'

In my experience, most people can be divided into two groups: those who are old enough to remember when you kept food on hand for company, and those who aren't.

For those of you in the latter group, let me explain. Before text messaging and social media made us all unconditionally, mercilessly reachable, people would do this thing called "stopping by." They would be passing by a friend's house, maybe on the way home from work or shopping, and they would just ... stop. With no warning. No notice whatsoever. "I was just in the neighborhood," they would say. I remember my mother and I would do this on many a Saturday. It wasn't an everyday occurrence, but it was common enough that you had to be ready.

"Crazy," you might exclaim. "People just appeared on your doorstep? How did you cope with the uncertainty?" Well, most of us had moms who kept a little something on hand to eat or drink that was extra nice, just in case anyone stopped by. That way, we were always ready.

Today's readings are about a lot of things: prayer, hope, redemptive suffering. They're about what it means to *be* a Christian, and not just what it means to do Christian things.

Most of all, though, they're about readiness. If God showed up at your door, would you be ready for Him? Would you be ready for what He gives you, or what He takes away? Would you be ready for Him to interrupt the plans you have for yourself? To disrupt the idea you carry in your mind of what a servant or a steward is supposed to be?

Read your Bible. Say your rosary. Go to Mass. Get to Confession. Talk to God — every day, not just when you think you need Him. That way, you are always ready.
