### How do we respond to God's call?

How often have you heard the saying that God's way is not our way? Sometimes it is difficult for us to try and "fit" our standards of living into what God may be asking us to do, it just doesn't work, and something has to



give. Today we see how God's call can be a hard pill to swallow. Traditionally we used to think that God's call only involved religious and ordained ministries of the church. If we really listen to the scriptures for this week it is clear that God's call extends to everybody in all walks of life.

The first reading as well as the gospel highlights being called by God. It is a wonderful opportunity for all of us to look at our own baptismal commitments to share in the priesthood of Christ in service to the Church and one another. In the first reading we hear how the prophet Elisha is called by God to become a prophet. Elijah who is one of the most fascinating figures of the Old Testament, approaches Elisha and throws his cloak over him as a symbol of being called. Being cloaked with a mantle, symbolized commission by the Spirit to do an important work for God. Apparently prophets were known by this piece of dress, which they wore while preaching the word of God. Elisha however was in no hurry to respond to God's call. It is apparent that the work Elisha was doing meant more to him than any prophetic call. He did know that there was a choice to make and he didn't have much time to make it. However realizing the urgency in Elijah he immediately destroyed his very livelihood by burning his plough and slaughtering the oxen. He then fed his family which was the beginning of his ministry in providing for others. He serves as a good model to everyone who is dedicated to serving God.

In the gospel we find Jesus extending an invitation to many people to come and be his followers. Rather than being met with enthusiasm, Jesus finds that his followers had many excuses why they couldn't respond to his call. Other priorities, mostly family obligations caused many people to reject the call Jesus was offering. However in spite of these rejections, Jesus continues to move forward not looking back bemoaning the people who wouldn't respond. He is intent on fulfilling the mission God had given him.

If we take the time to read between the lines it is almost scary how human behavior hasn't changed much in the last couple thousand years. Answering God's call to ministry is not an easy thing to foster in our churches. Every week our churches are full of people who are willing to give one hour a week to worship, but we have to be careful to keep things under one hour. Then it is back to routine without much involvement in works of social justice and service to others. Luke's gospel illustrates the excuses any of us can offer when Jesus calls. It is true that people have work and family commitments and it is not always easy to get involved in church activities. The task remains, however. We all must be single minded in pursuit of our mission. We have all been called by name to be the presence of Jesus to the poor, the lonely, the brokenhearted, the sick and suffering. How many excuses will it take before we get it? Jesus calls us all to come and follow after him.

### **R.C.I.A.**



The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults consists of four distinct periods. Each period is marked by a formal Rite, or public celebration by the assembly.

The First Period is known as Inquiry. During this period, those who have an interest in learning more about the Catholic Church are invited to just "come and see." During this time which is very informal, there is no commitment to the Church; it is a time for getting to know one another, for sharing food and stories, and for beginning to ask the big questions: what role, if any has God played in my life: Why do I think that God might be calling me at this time to explore the Catholic Faith? Why do I think it might be this particular faith community?

During this time, inquirers and Team members hopefully become comfortable in each other's company and while there is not so much of an emphasis on formal learning, we do touch on some general topics of common interest and curiosity such as Scripture, Who is God? Who is Jesus? And we attempt to answer any burning questions participants may bring to the table. In addition, we try to make the inquirers feel more at home when they attend weekly liturgies.

At the end of this period, which may range from several weeks to a year or more, those who feel they are ready to do so are formally welcomed into the RCIA by celebrating the Rite of Welcoming in church. It is a time when the parish community gets to reassure the inquirers that, although they need not make a commitment to us at this point, we, the Church, make a commitment to them - to nurture and support them through our prayers and example. Now, they are officially recognized by the community as those who are beginning the Journey of Faith towards the Easter Vigil.
