

## I Am the Resurrection and the Life...

On this 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Lent we are presented with the dramatic story of Lazarus being raised from the dead. In this gospel of John we can see that the raising of Lazarus by Jesus is definitely to be considered a "sign" that is more than a miracle; a revealing deed



pointing towards Jesus' true identity as "the Resurrection and the Life."

Ezekiel in the first reading sets the stage for what is to unfold with the liturgy by speaking to us about the hope of life and resurrection. He was a powerful visionary and communicator and a man of hope. He speaks from the heart about the power and promise of Yahweh. He speaks to the people of a promise of raising a beaten people from the grave of defeat, slavery, humiliation and despair. It promises to restore all they imagine they have lost and more. This resurrection of Ezekiel speaks well of the power of God and fits right into the story of Lazarus.

The story of Lazarus being raised from the dead has implications beyond Lazarus' return to life and bringing the crowd to belief. First of all, Lazarus' death and being brought back to life foreshadows Jesus' and our journey from death to life. Even as amazing as the raising of Lazarus is, the full extent of Jesus' power over death would be revealed only in his resurrection and in ours. Second, the life that Jesus gives us is a life in which we never die at all. Resurrection is not returning to live more of this life; it is a gift of life ever after.

Unlike the story we find in Luke's gospel where Mary has chosen the better part, in this gospel Mary seems to come out on top. While Mary will basically repeat what has been previously said by Martha, she appears to be struggling with grief and sorrow. On the other hand, Martha is definitely seen as the ideal believer, expressing not only the best of Jewish hope in a resurrection "on the last day," but also the core of early Christian faith in the resurrection. If we read between the lines of this drama, we can clearly see the questions that the early Christians had about death and afterlife.

Today is a great opportunity for us, as individuals and as a community, to sit down and update where we stand with regard to our faith in a resurrection. The bottom line then is: do we believe in the resurrection of Jesus? Before anything else, we ought to be clear on that foundational matter and its implications.

We do not have all the answers, so we ought to remain modest concerning the way we speak of the afterlife. But, on the

other hand, if we truly believe in the resurrection of Christ, we should know that he is "the first born of the dead" and the warrant of our own resurrection. There should be no compromising on both terms of the equation, and this should be a tremendous inspiration for us to live as resurrected people. The question is now ours to answer: "Do you believe this?" What will be our answer?

## Filling the Ark!

At this rate, it won't be long until our ARK is filled! The generosity of our parish is sometimes overwhelming. It is gratifying to see that we are so willing to share what we have with those who have so much less.

This week we were able to board: 1 Trio of Guinea Pigs and one Water Buffalo. There are many animals who have yet to be placed on the ARK, if you would like to make a donation please put it in the collection basket.

# **Gift of a Buffalo:** The Water Buffalo is certainly any farmer's friend! Thai farmers



respectfully refer to the water buffalo as "the farmer's friend" because the animal provides the draft power that makes rice cultivation practical, particularly in remote areas. For farmers in Thailand and others throughout Asia, the huge animals

provide high-protein milk for families and organic fertilizer for their farms. In the verdant, rugged mountains of the Philippines, farmer Bagwan and his wife Loge remember the days before Heifer International helped them obtain a water buffalo. "We had to do everything manually, even till our land," he and other barefoot villagers used sharpened sticks to prepare mountain rice paddies for planting. The arduous labor left the villager exhausted, often nursing bruised and bleeding feet. Hand planting produced barely enough rice to live on. "Today our water **buffalo has improved the lives and health of our family**," he said. Water buffalo allow subsistence-level farmers to harvest four times what they can produce by hand-planting.

#### **First Reading:**
