A Cleansing of Our Hearts

Today our liturgy is packed with violence as well as the very laws that were given to protect people from violence. It seems that we are presented with yet another contradiction in the message of Jesus. Here is a man who most often shows us the extreme example of what it



means to live a peaceful life losing his temper and exhibiting a great deal of violence directed at a number of people. Jesus is cleansing the temple alright, but why is he doing it in such a violent manner? Try to imagine yourself inside that temple, going about your own business when all of a sudden Jesus freaks. I am sure that it was unsettling to say the least.

Why was Jesus so angry? Was it because there were people in the temple taking advantage of others? Were people taking advantage of a sacred space for their own gain? Was it because Jesus was far more concerned with justice rather than sacrifice? It is probably a little of all these reasons. Were the people really doing something wrong? Was not the temple the "safe" place to offer sacrifice and do commerce? So, why did Jesus all of a sudden object to what had been happening in the temple for hundreds of years. It is obvious that he wanted the people to understand he was claiming absolute authority over the Temple, that his risen body would become the central shrine that would replace the Temple.

We as Christians do not like violent images of Jesus. When we think of Jesus we like to do so as that gentle man who sat peacefully on the mountain giving his life changing sermon, or the individual who beckoned the children to come to him. We don't mind seeing Jesus feeding the 5,000 or raising someone from the dead. These are all peaceful images of how we like to imagine Jesus. However, the man brandishing the whips and cords doesn't necessarily sit well with us.

Life as we live it has an awful lot of violence to it. As we see Jesus reacting so violently we are confronted to the violence within ourselves, or at least the potential of violence. We are confronted in the same way that the love of Jesus may be lacking in us. We react to violence in a number of ways. Often we tend to take out our rage and anger on someone or something else exhibiting passive aggressive behavior. Or, we can embrace a mass amount of guilt and take on the responsibility for the evil in life making ourselves to blame. However, the real meaning of violence lies somewhere between these two extremes. It is good for all of us to probe the meaning of violence in our own lives as well as in our nation.

Not all anger need explode into violent behavior. There is a certain violence in the way we speak of other people who are different from us, the ways we use power to exploit the weak, the ways we are silent in the face of massive injustice, the ways in which people in leadership lie to us and their lies lead to violence. There is violence in any behavior that de-humanizes people. Jesus did purify the temple, maybe to show us how during lent we all need to purify the temples of our hearts.

Women weave fleece into warm clothing to wear or sell. They load them up with goods for market and trek with them across rugged slopes at high altitudes.
