

"...there are many dwelling places."

One of the great mysteries of life has to do with what lies ahead of us after this life is ended. We ponder what heaven might be like, where it is and how will we be when we get there. Ever since religions embraced the idea of eternal life people have wondered



about what God might look like. Today we are given a glimpse of what Jesus refers to when he speaks of eternal life and the presence of God. Jesus speaks of dwelling places in this Sunday's gospel. However, the dwelling places that Jesus speaks of are not row houses nor sprawling, multi-million dollar mansions.

Jesus speaks of his "Father's house," dwelling places," and "preparing a place." At first we, like the disciples might think of this as a physical location, a destination such as we could find if we knew "the way." Jesus leads us to a deeper understanding when he reveals where he and the Father dwell: within one another. One surprise of the gospel is that Jesus' dwelling place is not a space but a relationship: "I am in the Father and the Father is in me." The way to this dwelling place is Jesus who leads us into the heart of God. The gospel is challenging us to enter into a profound relationship with Jesus, which ultimately means we share a profound relationship with the Father as well.

In the second reading St. Peter, like St. John, speaks of our intimate relationship with God in Christ, but he uses different images. God dwells not in a house of stone, but in a spiritual house made of living stones. We are that spiritual house, those living stones, because we are chosen and precious in the sight of God.

Another surprise of the gospel is that there are, indeed, "many dwelling places" as many as there are faithful disciples who are the spiritual house, the living stones, the presence of the risen Jesus for each other. The astounding message of the risen Jesus is that we ourselves are the living, risen Jesus. Jesus charges us to do the works that he does. The first "work" is to open us to God's indwelling – everything else depends on this.

In the gospel we find once again that the disciples do not have a clue as to what Jesus is speaking about. Try to imagine that after three years of faithful listening to Jesus, of witnessing his deeds of compassion and innumerable healings he had been performing, of receiving Jesus' instructions and warnings about their own future mission, and as Jesus is about to "pass from this world to the Father," the Twelve still get almost everything wrong and seem to be completely at a loss when Jesus speaks about the events that are about to unfold. These are the people whom we look to as the leaders of our faith! The gospel of Jesus was as much of a challenge to those disciples as it is to us today.

As our Liturgies move toward Pentecost, we find ourselves more and more challenged to encounter the risen Jesus. We do that in our everyday lives by doing the works of Jesus and by recognizing the risen Jesus in the other. The practical challenge here is that our baptism plunges us not only into a relationship with the "Triune God" but also into a profound relationship with each other. Therefore, our belief in the resurrection and the good news of salvation is played out concretely in the way we treat others in justice, mercy, forgiveness, and love. Relationships always make demands on us. Moreover, we cannot have a relationship with Jesus and the Father without relationships with each other. That is both the challenge and the good news!

Congratulations to Fr. Mike on his 43rd Ordination Anniversary on May 3. May God reward you and bless you for your caring and dedicated service.


