"Whatever you do for the least..."

This is the final week of the liturgical year, the Solemnity of Christ the King. Over the past few weeks our readings have been speaking to us about being organized, ready, and prepared for the last days. Whether we think of this in terms of the end of



times or the end of our life, the result is the same: we need to live our lives in preparation for the gift of everlasting life.

Ezekiel in the first reading speaks to us of how the religious leaders of Israel were negligent in their role as shepherds and as a result the people suffered. There is much wisdom to be found in this reading and it pertains not only to people in a position of leadership, but to all of us. I shudder to think what God would say to the shepherds of our world today for their negligence. How often have we watched TV evangelists crying for forgiveness because of their failure to shepherd. Every now and then we read in the newspaper about how some administrator misappropriated funds of a church for no reason other than selfish gain. The Catholic Church has been devastated by some bishops who were involved in covering up crimes of pedophilia in their dioceses. They acted on the "good name" of the church rather than tending to those who had been molested by priests. We have all been affected from the fall out of many CEOs and presidents of corporations who recklessly mismanaged funds. For all of these acts of greed and recklessness there is a price to pay, and we are reminded by Ezekiel that God will gather us all together and restore the flock to wholeness and holiness. It is a strong message of hope during times of such turbulence.

As easy as it is at times to be able to point our finger and shake our heads, the gospel quickly brings us back to reality in reminding us that we are all leaders who share in a responsibility of tending to all of God's sheep. Jesus in a simple way enlightens us to the fact that salvation is promised to all those who do the simple humanitarian acts like caring for the abandoned and forgotten people of the earth. Through simple human acts of everyday life we are promised everlasting peace with Christ our King. The impact of this gospel becomes our final proof of membership in the kingdom of God. We meet Christ in the needy and are judged by our own willingness or failure to respond.

The Kingship of Christ then becomes not something of honor and glory; rather it is one of love and service, not dominion and exploitation. Jesus reminds all of us that this level of love and service must go hand in hand. We cannot have one without the other. We are reminded by St. Paul that it is through our Baptism that we embrace this life of service. If we are true to the call that we took at Baptism, then we will be true to the call of

service in the name of Christ our King. What is so absolutely amazing about this Gospel is that Jesus makes these simple human acts of kindness to the level of identifying himself in an absolute sense, with those to whom these acts of kindness and mercy are shown. "When you do this to them, you do it to me." On this last Sunday of the year we are gently reminded that our salvation depends on how we respond to this com-
