

God calls us all to be leaders...

Today our liturgy makes reference to the responsibility of leadership in the Church as well as in life. It is easy to see how people in leadership can become lax and start to use their position of authority for their own gain. It is



amazing how power and control can take us over without our even being aware of it. Malachi in the first reading is reprimanding the leaders of the Church for not following the Lord's ways of justice, and we must remember that the leaders of the Church were often leaders in other aspects of life, so it was just not in matters of faith and morals that abuses were taking place. In the gospel we have Jesus taking this notion a step further by associating the responsibility of leadership to all of us. We are told that "the greatest among you must be your servant."

It is so easy for us sit back and recognize how many leaders in our world today are guilty of the things Jesus brings to mind. It is a whole different matter to look at ourselves and see just how often in life we too are guilty of mismanaging life, as well as the people around us. It is difficult to be a leader today and stay true to ourselves and the message of Christ's peace and justice. He clearly reminds us in the Gospel that there should be no other authority than that of God our Father. It is the love of God that should always be first and foremost in all of our actions with one another.

If we look at our lives and are honest, how many times do we busy ourselves with things we think are so important, when the time could have been spent on things that bring much more peace rather than more anxiety, and when we experience anxiety in life, we drag other people into it. We are all called to be aware of the simple fact that we are all leaders in life. We are all responsible for one another, even when it calls us to get out of our own comfort zones. In life we are both leaders and followers, and there should be not be any absolute models other than God our Father along with Jesus his son. When we are to call no one father or teacher, we are reminded that it is God the Father who should be the true leader for us to follow.

What is it that we hide behind in life? What excuses do we use for not helping others? Who do we blame when things go wrong? Today we are being reminded that we all need to be responsible for ourselves as well as the people around us. God will always exalt the humble, and humble those who exalt themselves. When our actions do not match what we preach, can we reach out in humility to God and one another. The questions we need to ask ourselves is: How often in life do we convince ourselves that we are too busy to help others, how often do we need to humble ourselves before one another?

Today, 75% of women and men religious are over age 70. Many institutions simply do not

have the resources to meet the dramatically escalating costs of care for their growing elderly populations. There are two groups here in the Diocese of Greensburg that directly receive these funds: Carmel of the Assumption and the Benedictine Sisters of Saint Emma Monastery.
