

From This World to the Next...

It is the month of November and traditionally during this time of year we think of all of our loved ones who have died. This week our readings speak to us about what happens after we leave this world. In both the first reading as well as in the gospel we



are given "insight" into the life to come. Belief in the afterlife in many ways is as much a struggle for us today as it was for many of the Sadducees and others in Jesus' time. Our society is mixed with so many ideas about life and death that sometimes it does get a little confusing. For example: New Age concepts of cosmic unity and Eastern beliefs in reincarnation witness to our desire for continued life in some form and our struggle with what that might be like.

The readings that are found at the end of our liturgical year are certainly not meant to scare us. Rather they are given to us so that we may reflect in a direct way on what Jesus' Second Coming is about and to help prepare us. Our faith reminds us that the choices that we make in this life will determine the judgment we receive at the Second Coming, and knowing this helps us to prepare. Few of us will ever be faced with the extreme choice the brothers in the first reading must make; nevertheless, we, like the seven brothers, live in a world full of wrongdoing and life threatening situations.

In reality, we do face "death" every day: dying to self. Gospel living then is so much more than simply religious practices, gospel living means that we align ourselves with Jesus' living and dying. Jesus modeled for us the self-sacrificing giving which leads us all to eternal life. The question we must ask ourselves is: How badly do we want to share in that eternal life?" The choices that we make today about whether we follow Jesus faithfully and live gospel values by dying to ourselves reveal the extent of our own hope in sharing in Jesus' risen life.

What does happen to us when we die? This is a question that civilizations have been asking themselves since the beginning. It was this question that prompted the actions of the mother and her seven children in the first reading. They were able to choose death knowing that there was something better in the next life. Over the past few decades many people have shared what they saw in near death experiences. Many of these people describe seeing a bright light and a deep sense of peace. Unbelievers scoff at this, but they cannot deny, nor can they explain the universal expressions of life after death.

Unfortunately, Jesus never defined life after death. He preached more about life now, and suggested that the quality of life after we die is directly related to how we lived here on earth. Certainly, in the Sermon on the Mount and the Beatitudes, he makes specific references to eternal rewards, and has referred to himself as "the resurrection and the life." But, he does not describe what resurrection or heaven is like! So, we are all left only with faith, to imagine what heaven and resurrection will be like.

Throughout the month of November we remember our deceased relatives and friends in our prayers and at Mass. There is a book in the front of the church where you can list the names of all of the deceased members of your families and friends.

October Count

Every year the diocese asks us to count the people who are coming to church during the month of October. This year our attendance for the five weekend Masses was 1400. If we divide it by the five weekends in October we get: 280 people per weekend. Then when we break that down between the 3 Masses we end up with an average of 90 people at each Mass. Since 2019 (the last year before the pandemic) we were averaging about 130 people at each Mass. As you can see, our numbers continue to drop each year. Just as the diocese uses these statistics for planning, so too do we need to look at these numbers.

Christmas Wreaths

Once again we will be selling decorated wreaths for the cemetery or for your homes. The cost will be the same as last year: \$30 per wreath and \$3 if you need a stand for the cemetery. There will be sign-up sheets in the back of the church if you are interested
