A Matter of the Heart!

This Sunday's gospel presents us with another simple yet very complex story. Jesus tells us of two people: one a Pharisee and the other a sinful tax collector. Jesus could not have picked two people that were more opposite in their approach to life. The tax



collector extracted money from his fellow Jews to support the efforts of the Roman government. Often the tax collector would keep a portion of the money for himself and give the remaining funds to his employers. The Pharisee on the other hand lived his life keeping the traditions of Israel alive even during difficult times of occupation. It is interesting that just like the story of the rich man and Lazarus most of us would almost immediately identify with the sinful tax collector and his humble prayer. Not many of us would like to admit being like the Pharisee. Yet, some of us really are like the Pharisee in that we put our pious acts above everything else and think that this is how we are justified.

For example, some people fill their houses with statues and shrines and say prayers constantly, but are anything but charitable and self giving toward others. Others constantly judge the prayer practice of others thinking they themselves have the right formula. Truth be told, probably most of u shave something of both the Pharisee and tax collector in us. So this Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to assess not only our prayer life, but also our basic stance toward God.

Sirach in the first reading simply tells us that God shows no favorites. Whether privileged and rich or lowly and poor, God gives the same treatment. God will not accept bribes, nor will God allow us to "pile us grace." Many feel that they can pile up grace. The more prayers you say, the more times you bless yourself with holy water, the more genuflections you perform, the more you will earn God's favor. It is this attitude against which Sirach speaks. For Sirach, each one of us gets from God what we deserve - and that merit is not based on wealth or prestige but on conscientious service to God. Sirach reminds us that God sees into the heart and receives prayers and offerings that are made in humility and sincerity. Externals even good works and charitable offerings, can become an obstacle to pure religious vision, and lead us to think that we are better than others. As we look at the parable of the Pharisee and tax collector we must be careful not to make the Pharisee into a whipping boy. Nor is the tax-collector the model of good behavior. Jesus is inviting us to look beyond external behavior to see the interior self that Scripture calls "the heart" – that center of a person where one's motivations and concept of self is formed. Although the Pharisee is faithful to pious practices, he is missing the heart of prayer and the core of faith demonstrated by the tax collector. It is the tax collectors humility that draws him closer to God and allows him to go home justified.

Prayer helps us to enter into and maintain an intimate relationship with God. Like we learned last week, we must be consistent in our prayer, for it is in our prayer that we acknowledge who we are before God.

Somewhere in this parable is a little bit of all of us. We just need to search our hearts and get in touch with the Pharisee and tax collector that are roaming around in each of us. Remember that it is always a matter of the heart!
