

If We Had Faith the Size of a **Mustard Seed...**

Surrendering can be one of the most difficult things we can do in life. We seem to have the attitude that when we surrender anything we are giving up, and nobody wants to be thought of as a quitter. Well, giving up or surrendering seems to be what we are being



asked to do today through our liturgy. We are asked to give up on always wanting things to go our way, we are asked to give up on selfishness and greed, we are asked to give up on always wanting control! These certainly are hard things for us to let go of. This week we are reminded of the power of faith and what it is able to do in our lives.

How often in life have you heard people bemoaning about all the wrong and evil that is apparent in our world. The question that people ask is "how can a loving God permit so much evil." It is true that violence does seem to define our world. Recent pools reveal that the overwhelming majority of Americans believe that we were bogged down in a hopeless military and political mess. Suicide bombings were on the increase, and American military and civilian casualties were at an all-time high. This contemporary dilemma is remarkably similar to the world in which the prophet Habakkuk lived. As he cries out: "Why, O God, do you allow this to happen?" The answer is unexpected. He is told not to give up and give some time for the mind of God to be revealed. We are given that same answer today.

The question of evil is not an easy one to answer in fact it is a strong dynamic in life that people use to question the existence of a loving God. This week, we are reminded that faith is a power that can get us through these times of turmoil and trouble. It is belief in God's justice and love trusting in that goodness which allows us to endure suffering in life. God has many fairweathered friends who are with God as long as everything is going their way. Real faith is proved by steadfast loyalty to God when the road isn't so easy and life seems unfair.

The disciples in the gospel ask Jesus for more faith. They believed that if they had more faith, all would be well. They are quickly reminded that it is not a question of more or less faith, but what they can do with the faith they've got. Jesus did believe that the disciples had great faith, but what they really wanted was more power to do fantastic things. All we are asked to do is to be faithful to what we are called to do, and to be faithful means being a servant of all. Jesus never promised us a rose garden in life. He promises us hope in the midst of evil.
