

October Count

The month of October has been the time set aside by our diocese to count all of the people who attend church. **Throughout the weeks of October** we will count all of the people who come to church. At the end of the month, I will publish the totals. So, if you see someone counting, you will know what they are doing. This count is important for the Diocese when planning for the future.

Always Be Grateful!

It is the little things that make life worth living, and yet we seem to overlook the small things in life every day. Imagine living your life from day to day without those countless small blessings. What a major difference our attitudes would be. Yet,



how is it that we can be so ungrateful by overlooking the small "miracles" we find in life. Our liturgy today presents us with a number of healing miracles. In the first reading through the intercession of Elisha the prophet, Naaman is healed of his leprosy and in the gospel Jesus heals ten people of the same dreaded disease. Although both of these healings show us the miraculous healing power of God, ironically the message we carry with is today is not about the healings rather about being grateful.

Being thankful for the blessings of life is at the very foundation of what our belief in God is about. How often have we heard parents remind their children to say thank you when they receive a gift? It teaches them to acknowledge the giver of the gift and show gratitude for whatever has been given. Although being thankful and showing gratitude seems to be fading away from our social teachings, it is still a basic part of relationships in life that needs tended to.

From our gospel today we see that there were 10 lepers made well and only one returned to give thanks for the gift, and it was the one that you wouldn't expect gratitude from. Only the Samaritan the "half-breed" returned to say thank you to Jesus. In this sense he was not only cured physically, but spiritually. Once again we are shown that it is in the unexpected that we learn the greatest lessons. Prayers of thanksgiving and gratitude in Jewish religious ritual are considered to be the highest form of praise to God. Once Naaman, the Syrian, realized he had been healed by God, his gratitude prompted him to believe, so too with the Samaritan leper.

The nine Jewish lepers who did not return were certainly healed physically, but their spirits remained leprous. Their ingratitude is worse than the leprosy from which they were healed. While their disfigurement had been healed, they really lay dead, for they were trapped in their own selfishness. This is what happens on the journey to Jerusalem: on the way we are all cleansed. This is one reason why all the little things of our everyday lives, those things which happen to us along the journey are so important. They are manifestations of God's acting on our behalf, healing us and saving us.

One challenge of this Sunday's gospel is to see God's promise of salvation unfolding in these everyday events of our lives. We don't have to go looking for the "big miracles." Faithful service

is our response to seeing God in these events. Gratitude, acknowledging God's action on our behalf is an all-enveloping contest for living our lives. When gratitude is put on as a way of living, then worship too, becomes a way of living. Shakespeare said it through King Lear when he wrote, "How sharper than a serpent's tooth it is to have a thankless child."
