October Count

Throughout the month of October it has been customary to count the people who attend church. This count is important when we look at the Diocese and see where we are going and how we can best manage the support and coverage of our parishes.

We are all called!

Jesus reminds us in the gospel this week that "Many are invited, but few are chosen." If this is taken out of context, one can easily conclude that only a small number of people are to be saved. We must be careful to look at the entire picture before we come to such errone-



ous conclusions. Both the first reading as well as the gospel speaks to us about banquets reminding us about the gift of eternal life that lies at the end of our time on this earth. In both instances, attending these festive occasions or not has serious ramifications: the judgment about who enters eternal life.

It is easy for us to identify with the Kings disappointment when he went to such great lengths to prepare a banquet and have the invited guests refuse to come. How disappointing for us to plan any "party" awaiting with anticipation and joy only to have our hopes dashed when people do not show up. In the invitation issued from Jesus' story the invitation is extraordinary: it comes from a king, it involves a lavish feast for the wedding of his son, it is issued several times. Who could refuse? Yet, people foolishly do and with tragic consequences. But in fact, even more is at stake for us than a royal dinner. The first reading reveals the wedding feast to be nothing less than the messianic banquet of eternal life. The wedding feast is obviously a symbol of God's covenant. This is the invitation that is issued to us; our response is either to receive or reject eternal life. This is what is at stake in accepting the invitation: eternal life!

How we respond to God's gifts, or fail to, is the thread running through these stories. What we need to do is look into our own hearts and determines in what ways do we "ignore the invitation." How do we forget the invitation to "come to the feast," not just about Sunday Mass, but about the life God gives at every moment? What God wants is the wedding feast to take place and the house to be filled with guests. Yet, god cannot force anyone into it, nor can God spare anyone from a free and full response.

Instead of spending time speculating about the number of people who are to be saved, we should see to it that we respond properly to God's call, which is an invitation to salvation for all. We are called to change our lives to be in accordance with our commitment to be a disciple. In today's gospel, the main thrust of the parable is that God's salvation, symbolized here by the wedding feast, is actually offered to an ever increasing number. Ultimately, many do accept the invitation and come to the feast. Out of the great number of guests attending, only one is in fact rejected, because he does not wear the wedding garment. Therefore we can clearly see that many found salvation and only one was rejected.

There is no doubt that God wills that all be saved, but Jesus warns us as well. Whoever wants to enter God's kingdom and have a share in the wedding feast has to go through the narrow gate or to wear the wedding garment. That is, we have to go through the paschal mystery. Salvation is free but remains demanding and implies changes in our lives for us to produce fruits that are worthy of God's kingdom.
