### Giving to God as to Caesar

With all of the political rhetoric that is going on these days, the famous line, "Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God" will receive a lot of attention. This can be useful as long as it does not become



an occasion for moralizing or political commentary. For the scriptural context is much wider, and understanding that is the foundation of good citizenship as well as effective discipleship. The foundation is that God is the Giver of everything. Knowing "what is Caesar's" and "what is God's" comes only through knowing God's call and gift.

The church-state question introduced in today's gospel is as old as the hills. History has shown us many examples of people living in societies where one or the other is supreme, and they don't seem to make it. It is only when the two entities; ones religious beliefs and the laws of any given country, can harmoniously coincide. The question of relationship between state and religion, politics and religion, is a very touchy issue, and finding the right balance is no easy task. On one hand we find the convinced militants – some would say activists – who miss no opportunity to campaign for social justice and challenge both civil and religious authorities. On the other hand, there are those who pretend that religion should stay away from any political issue and care solely about spiritual matters.

Both sides may actually claim today's gospel with Jesus' concluding statement, "Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God," as an argument in favor of their position, up against the position of the other side. Well, Jesus' answer shows that he doesn't see the question as "either...or": "Repay to Caesar...and to God..." Jesus does not discredit or discard political authorities but simply puts them into perspective. For him politics and religion have their own autonomy. It remains for everyone to discern "what belongs to Caesar" and "what belongs to God."

Isaiah in the first reading shows how the power of God has authority even over non-believers. It is the power of God that will ultimately show justice. The Second Vatican Council follows along with this teaching. It is expressed by the Council that the church pledges to work with any persons or groups whose goal is justice, peace and works of charity even though they may not share our faith. Once we discover what image we wish to reflect, our lives and its decisions will fall into place. Conflicts and differing opinions will always be a part of our society. We must always learn to listen to the Voice of God in

our hearts and be true to ourselves.

Living in this world and our response to it is connected to our religious stance that God is sovereign. When God is truly the center of our lives, there is no problem with giving others their due. Doing good for others not only improves our own world but strengthens right relationships with one another.
