

Our Social Call to Love...

In our gospel for today Jesus uses the word love but he does so in expansive terms. Love of God which Jesus pairs with love of neighbor is a down to earth norm that governs concrete interactions with our fellow human beings, espe-



cially the neediest among us. If we wish to love God, we must care for the vulnerable and needy neighbor.

Sometimes we compartmentalize our lives in such a way that we express our love of God only in terms of religious practices, for example, faithfully going to Sunday Mass, or saying prayers. Genuine love of God must also be expressed in care for widows, the orphan, and the poor, indeed all of our neighbors. He tells the Pharisees that they must love with their all. This is exactly what Jesus did; he loved with his all to the extent that he gave his life for us. This is the social justice Jesus demands from us.

What is our responsibility as Baptized Catholics to the call and mission of Catholic Social Teaching? Are we even aware that the Church has such teachings? The Catholic Church has a long history of thinking and writing on social issues, and scriptures such as today's passage are the source. True believers will go the extra mile to care for the marginalized and the vulnerable because we are conscious of the place of the poor at the banquet table of the Lord.

The text from Exodus in our first reading speaks of poverty in a way that not many of us can relate to. Can you even imagine being so poor that the jacket you wear during the day must be your blanket at night, or that in spite of your suffering, people are able to look through you as if you didn't even exist? This is the reality of our world, and most of us do not want to see it. We are reminded once again that God is the champion of the powerless, the defender of the defenseless. In speaking of the poor, the aliens, the widows and the orphans, God is drafting a blueprint of justice and mercy, reminding the people of Israel that it wasn't too far in their past that they suffered in the same way. Are their memories so short that they forget?

You and I may never have suffered the inhumane poverty and maltreatment that is mentioned in the scriptures, but isn't that all the more reason for us to be grateful for the life we have and the blessings that we are able to share? The community of God is one where all, regardless of their state in life, must be treated with dignity and guaranteed safety so that they can live free from fear

Just how far are we as a community willing to go to make this call of God's justice a reality? There are many issues that we are confronted with in society. Most often we turn a deaf ear and choose to ignore, but the issues and the suffering is still there none the less. We can sit down and debate issues of illegal aliens coming to our country or the use of capital punishment as a means of solving matters of crime, but ultimately the answer will always be the same: all God's creatures great and small must be acknowledged with dignity, compassion, respect and love. This is not something that can be done in a week or a year; it is a lifetime of work and awareness.

Today we are encouraged to ask ourselves; what neighbors do we find it easy to love, and who are the difficult neighbors and why is it so challenging to love them? We need always remember that to love the unseen God through service to neighbor is the true essence of religion.

Today, 75% of women and men religious are over age 70. Many institutions simply do not have the resources to meet the dramatically escalating costs of care for their growing elderly populations. During the appeal for the Retirement Fund for Religious, please recall the role of religious in your life, the ways that they have nourished
