

## **Our Limits Become Our Crosses!**

In a roundabout way our readings for this week speak to us about pushing to our limits. We are being asked to discern for ourselves just what are our limits and how far can we push them. Our society today is absolutely obsessed with sports, Americans do



love them. The Olympic Games attract millions of viewers. College football stadiums can seat in excess of 100,000 screaming fans. The TV schedule has more channels dedicated entirely to sports than to any other single kind of entertainment. Parents chauffeur their children to multiple games of multiples sports in any given week, often letting their own work slide in order to be spectators. A great number of college scholarships are for those gifted in sports. This list of proofs of our love of sports can go on and on. Perhaps part of our obsession rests in the sheer strength and endurance athletes' exhibit. It seems as though they reach a physical and emotional limit, and then regularly exceed that limit. Going beyond the limits of the ordinary is what makes champions.

Most of us experience limits in our lives; if not in sports, then in many other areas of life. But perhaps the one thing most of us face that pushes us to our limits is human suffering — whether physical, emotional, or spiritual. Suffering is something we simply cannot avoid because it takes us beyond the limits of human resilience, the threshold of pain, or our emotional self-control stability. People sometimes rationalize suffering as something gone wrong, as the absence of God or as being punished by God. In light of the cross and resurrection, however, suffering can become a more intense experience of God's presence and God's promise. This Sunday's gospel starkly tells us that the only way to life is through death, through suffering. The followers of Jesus must deny themselves and take up their cross; the followers must let go of their life in order to find life; unless one dies one cannot rise.

So, what are some of the "daily crosses" we must endure that push us to our limits? This will certainly be different for each of us. Maybe it has to do with patience or spreading ourselves too thin. Maybe we allow ourselves to get caught up into things that we have no business being in. This list can certainly go on and on, I am sure we can all think of many "crosses" that we must deal with every day. We are reminded today that it is not so much the crosses that become the issue, it is the way in which we accept them. Do we try to avoid them or deny that they are even there, or do we embrace them and deal with them the best we can. Eventually we all need to answer that for ourselves.

Sometimes our response to living the paschal mystery is enthusiastic because things are going well and we do not realize the demands. Then, when the going gets rough, when we are pushed to our limits, we kind of bog down and emotions tend to take over. The paschal mystery demands turning our heart toward God's love working in us, and this is not without its demands. Every day we must do all that we can to take up our crosses and deal with life!
