



Peace Be With You!

As the Church journeys through this season of Easter we are reminded over and over again what the message of the Risen Lord is all about. The first words that Jesus speaks to his disciples are always: "Peace be with you."



Throughout the years that Jesus taught, the very heart of his message was this greeting. When he sent his disciples out he instructed them: "whatever house you enter greet them with Peace be with you." As followers of the Lord we are to live by these very words. Simple as they may be, they carry with them a huge commitment.

Sometimes we do not recognize or appreciate nearly enough the little things in life that make the biggest differences. When we talk about being at peace, it is not necessarily the absence of conflict, rather it is a feeling that we get in our hearts. It is this feeling of peace that can make all of the difference in how we live our lives with one another. When we are not at peace with ourselves we certainly are not at peace with the people around us. Jesus brings to us the opportunity to be a part of his peace and when we accept that peace, life takes on a completely different path.

The Gospel for this week gives us the encounter with the disciples on the road to Emmaus. There are basically three things that Jesus leaves with us from this experience. First of all he greets his disciples with peace, he shares a meal with them and then he teaches them. This becomes the very essence of what we as followers are asked to do.

Some of the early disciples found it difficult to believe in the true meaning of the resurrection and thought that when Jesus appeared, he was only a ghost. St. Luke wants them to understand that Jesus is not a ghost but truly risen from the dead. His risen body bears within it the marks of the five wounds. His eating with them shows that he has a bodily reality and is not just a spirit. After the resurrection, there is continuity with his earthly life.

This week we all could look into our lives and determine just how we bring the Peace of the risen Christ to the people in our world. Peace in our hearts is the best gift God can share with us. Even when we are dealing with stress and the problems of life, if we have peace in our hearts we know we will be ok. Each of us has the power to help bring peace to others' hearts. Sharing a meal shows us the importance of helping the poor and providing for others with the joy of hospitality. To be a member of the Body of Christ calls us to become that "Christ" on the road to Emmaus. Through our hospitality and the peace we bring, we are helping others to understand what the message of Jesus is all about.

You know what are some of my favorite moments in Scripture? The little "Easter eggs" of Jesus' humanity, things like Jesus falling asleep, Jesus drawing in the sand, Jesus playing with kids. And how about Jesus rising from the dead, appearing to his disciples and saying, "So, have you got anything to eat?"

It's right for us to always keep in mind that Jesus is God. But we also have to remember that he was man. He got hungry. He cried when he felt sad and laughed when he felt happy. He got tired. He got bored.

Because he was God, none of those feelings ever led him into sin, like they do us. He never spent a car ride trying to pass the hours by seeing how annoyed he could make his older sister. He never smacked Peter over the head for saying something really stupid. But he did unleash some Biblically righteous anger on those traders in the temple, didn't he? And he wasn't shy about calling Peter "a Satan" when his friend tempted him to take the easy way out.

It's the tightrope walk we all try to balance every day, honoring our human emotions while still answering God's call to be better. Being perfect isn't the domain of the Christian — that's the domain of Christ only. Trying and failing, then trying again (and failing again) and again and again? That's the domain of the Christian.
