

Are You As Good As Your Word?

Everything in our Church is somehow related to our Baptismal commitments. Our commitments to those promises become the very principles from which we live our lives. Every minute of each and every day we are faced with choices that need to be made. Most of the time we



choose based out of habit or need. Once in a while we deal with decisions that might take more time and effort. However, all of our decisions should be based on the fact that we are rooted into the life of Christ. This should be the basis and foundation from which all of our choices are made.

Our readings for this Sunday are about commitment in life. A commitment is a statement that I will be there for you, a statement that you can trust my love and support. I'll keep my word for you. Why is it that something so basic and simple can be so difficult to make a part of our lives? Commitment is hard and takes a lot of work. Every one of us can relate to a time in life when it was difficult if not impossible to be true to our commitment. Joshua in the first reading has the Israelites renewing their commitments. Many of them had fallen away from fidelity to Yahweh and had placed their trust in idols. It is easy for us to look back and judge those people for straying from their covenant relationship with Yahweh. We find it difficult to understand how they could possible find refuge in strange gods. However, the idols that we deal with in our world are every bit as real as the ones the people had to face thousands of years ago. We must not be too judgmental of the ancient Israelites who fell prey to their own idols. Look at some of the idols we face today: power, money, possessions, body image, books, television, bigger and better homes, cars, boats, etc. etc. This list could certainly fill the space that is available for this article, but I think you get the idea.

It is not that we do not live up to our commitments; rather we keep our commitments and live them out only 50 percent of the time instead of being 100 percent committed. Once again we can see how easy it is to make a commitment but it becomes an entirely different matter to be true to them.

Jesus asks the disciples if they want to leave; he also asks us the same question. Every one of us need to look again at what our Baptism is asking of us, we all should re-evaluate those commitments and determine just how true we are to them. It is hard to give 100 per cent to our commitments, but that is what we are professing to do. Just how good of a parishioner are you, how attentive are you to the needs of your church, family and friends, are you faithful to the commitments you have made in serving a ministry, promises made to family and friends? These questions are all affected by our ability to be true to our

commitments. Are we as people, as good as our word? If not, what do we have to do to change? Today we are reminded that God is ever faithful and true to a committed life of love and support. As we embrace that love, we need to be aware of the promises and commitments we have made, and with the presence of God and the gift of the Eucharist be strong enough to be true to them.
