

We Have Nothing to Fear!

It has been said fear is the most widely experienced emotion. Everyone is afraid of something. From our Gospel this week we can easily see the terror which the disciples experienced as they sat in a tiny boat while the sea ravaged to swallow them up. Most



of us don't have the experience of being in the midst of a body of water during a fierce storm. We can certainly relate to the powerlessness and fear that it could bring. Ancient writings and stories often make reference to the power of the sea detailing the evil dangers that lurk within. It was widely believed through many cultures that the gods were the ones in control of the sea.

Job, our first reading details how God created the great seas and set the boundaries which contained them. From this very short exert, we are left with the knowledge that the God of the Old Testament is in command over the world. The author of the book not only identifies the power and control of Yahweh, it also implies Yahweh's closeness and presence to the world. Only God can control the sea.

Mark picks right up on this notion and is clearly showing that by calming the sea, Jesus was God. Only "God" could do such a thing. Mark wants us to understand and believe in the protection of God in times of fear, distress, confusion or lack of trust. The disciples are privileged with this experience and they come to know who Jesus was, or at least they begin to put the pieces together.

The storm that we read about today is a metaphor for many things in life. Whether it refers to the church with the many difficulties it encounters, or our own personal lives as we try to live out our discipleship. In either case we see that Jesus is always in the midst of our confusion and fears; urging us forward. He is drawing them into a deeper faith and awareness of God's protection and love. We too easily forget this when faced with situations that bring fear and doubt into life. Just as Jesus responds to the fear and terror of the disciples; He also responds in kind to ours. We are able to see in a real way that it is the love and care of Jesus that will always be there with power and care.

It becomes our challenge to always rely and trust in the protective care that is always before us. We are never alone even in the midst of the turbulence in life. The storming sea in the gospel symbolizes the unruly forces of chaos in life. It reminds us that the calming presence of the Risen Lord will always be in our heart, calling us to trust. It is this love of Christ dwelling within us that becomes the model for our own human experiences. As St. Paul tells us, anyone who has died with Christ no longer lives to satisfy his or her own ego, only to be for others. If we are able to forego our own fears in life we will be free to live for others. We actually have become a new creation, one that lives under the protective veil of God's love and care. Jesus is that hidden, silent God who is always there to calm the storm and still the waters.

If you volunteer in any way at the parish you need to obtain or update your clearances. One of the clearances that you will need is **Virtus** which is a Church requirement. This clearance may be obtained online or you can come to a session which will be held on **July 12 at 6:00 p.m.** in the Church Hall. Please note that that is for the first session. If you have taken Virtus five or more years ago you will need to be re-certified. *This workshop does not pertain to you*. Another certificate that we will offer is the **Mandated Reporter** which will be on **July 19**. This will also be held in the church hall. If you have any questions about any of the clearances you will need, please give us a call and we will help you.
