The Body and Blood of Christ

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ is the very heart of what our Church is about. Everything we are, all that we do and everything that we are to become as a people of God is focused in the gift of the Eucharist. The Eucharist be-



comes the very heart of what we are as a sacramental church. This is the greatest gift that God has given us as people to share in. Sometimes we don't appreciate what a gift the Eucharist is.

Today our liturgy connects the sacrifices of the Hebrew Scriptures to his very self. The Hebrews believed that blood is life; the sprinkled blood joins them to the blood splashed on the altar which symbolizes God. Thus a holy union or covenant is created with God. The author of our second reading makes the connection from the sacrifices of the Old Testament to the blood shed by Jesus for our eternal redemption. Jesus was a pure, unblemished sacrifice. While Old Testament sacrifices required the yearly sprinkling of blood on the people by a priest, Jesus, now the high priest, offers himself a sacrifice only once and for all a s sin offering for all peoples.

In our gospel, Jesus connects the bread and wine of the final meal he shared with his friends and disciples with his impending death and interprets them in light of the Old Testament tradition of sacrificial blood described in the first reading. The honor that Catholics show to the sacrament of Christ's body and blood is not a narrow expression of shallow piety. It is, rather, an expression of our recognition of the presence of God in all that is created, especially as God appears to the little ones whom the world does not recognize. The Eucharist is at the core of social justice. As we share in his Body and Blood, we surrender ourselves to be like Christ – a Passover lamb for our world today. For the most part we don't need to look for opportunities for total self-giving; the circumstances of daily life generously present them to us. The difference is that followers of Christ see self-sacrifice not simply in terms of an inconvenience that cannot be avoided but the means to fullness of life. This gift becomes a sign and symbol of a new covenant of God's love which is taken up by the disciples as a pledge of the fullness of life God offers to us all.

As members of the Body of Christ who share in this miraculous event, we are given the strength and courage to go into our world and become the martyrs for faith and human dignity. Taking the strength we receive form the Body and Blood of Jesus to work for peace and justice for all of God's creation.

St. Anthony Feast Day

This year, St. Anthony's Feast Day falls on Sunday. It will be celebrated at the 10:30 a.m. Mass when Fr. will bless any bread brought to the church. For years, tradition a been to bake bread, have it blessed and share it. There are several legends associated with St. Anthony's bread. One occurred in 1888 when a baker woman in France went to open her store and discovered the key would not work and the door would not open. When the locksmith tried, he was not able to open it either. As the locksmith left to get his tools, the woman prayed to St. Anthony that she would give some of her bakery bread to the poor if the door could be opened without force. When the locksmith returned, they tried the key once more and the door



easily opened. The baker kept her promise and the poor of the city received bread. Not long after, the baker woman's friends began promising a gift of bread or alms to the poor in return for prayers answered by the saint. Consider bringing your bread to church on Sunday and having it blessed!
