## Power of Prayer and Love

The Church is winding down with the Season of Easter and we hear the stories about how the early Christians worked to continue the message of Jesus. Over the past few weeks we have heard from John about the importance of love. That has to be the key ingredient to whatever the church is supposed to grow into. There are so many ways that we need to look at what this “love” is calling us to live. We are reminded in the first reading that every institution, whether political or religious needs to have structures that guarantee continuity and security. Families, schools, churches, and clubs all have them. We see how important it was to the apostles to have twelve members. This was an important issue because Jesus had promised that the 12 tribes of Israel would be restored and that they would rule in God’s kingdom. Continuity between the old and the new is guaranteed.



In choosing the successor for Judas, the apostles relied on the power of prayer before they made such an important decision. Throughout the New Testament we find that the importance of prayer was always recognized when any important decision was to be made. As they cast lots they trusted on the power of God’s love to guide them in their decisions and choice. The only thing we know about their requirements for this successor was that he had to be “one of those who was in our company all the while we had the Lord Jesus with us.” It is interesting to note that very little was known about any of the apostles. The New Testament rarely mentions them. When we think of them we tend to think of them as a group rather than individuals. After their choice the idea was that life would go on, and the work of the church could continue.

In the Gospel we find Jesus praying for the success and well-being of the future church. He makes reference to fears, joy, unity, happiness and holiness. This is a heartfelt reminder to us all that we do not set off to continue the ministry of Jesus on our own and without assistance; we receive the Holy Spirit and thus are assured of receiving the blessings for which Jesus prays. We take up Jesus’ ministry and are his risen presence in the world. The world for Jesus made reference to anything that was hostile to God. It was surely promised that the disciples would meet hostility in the world therefore Jesus prayed that they be “kept from the evil one” and share in his joy. In scripture, joy is that special grace that assures that, no matter what happens, a sense of God’s presence will never go away. These were the final words from a man who showed the disciples how to love and how to believe that faith in him will conquer all their troubles and fears.

With all of this comfort and support, why then do we still find it so difficult to love as we are called to? Why is love so hard to show or even talk about? First of all love must go out from each of us, it must come from within and this takes energy. When we love, we risk things like rejection and pain. Past experiences with love often keep us from loving as we should. In spite of these apprehensions, this is what we are all called upon to do: love one another! We simply cannot love alone. Love is always relationship. When the handsome Greek youth Narcissus stared at, and fell in love with his own image in a reflecting pool of water, he died! Jesus showed us that love is a conviction, a voice, and an action. Know that as Jesus prayed for the disciples, he prays also for us. This prayer feeds us to go out and love as we have been called to love, to live as our Baptism strengthens us to live.

### Catholic Communication Campaign

Our Diocese will take up the annual collection for the Catholic Communication Campaign (CCC) this weekend. By generously supporting this collection, you are helping to make our Church more accessible and connected to Catholics in our diocese and throughout the world.

Half of all the proceeds from this collection stay here in the Diocese of Greensburg to support our local communications efforts, which have helped the faithful stay connected during the worldwide health crisis. Donations support evangelization efforts including popular and innovative news outlets like the *The Catholic Accent* newspaper and quarterly magazine, The Accent Online digital news site, and The Accent On-Air quarterly television show, as well as the diocesan website and social media platforms, which have helped the Diocese and its parishes reach up to 100,000 people in a week.

The remaining half of the proceeds from the collection support communications projects around the world including the island of Samar in the Philippines, home to nearly two million people, about 90% of whom are Catholic. Many live in remote villages outside the reach of television and internet. Instead, radio is a critical source of information.

### CRS Spotlight



COVID-19 cases in Nepal have been rising since April, jumping from 152 new cases per day at the beginning of the month to 4,831 new cases per day by April 29 - an uptick of more than 3,000%. Worryingly, the RT-PCR test positivity rate has increased from 4% to 32% over the same time period. In some regions, as many as 90% of tests are returning positive. 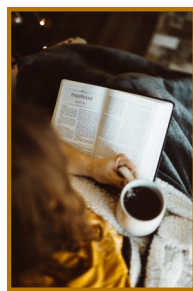
