Loving God and Neighbor

We have all heard the expression "you can't see the forest for the trees." This expression sums up what our liturgy is about today. Sometimes we look so hard to find answers to life's questions and they are right in front of us. We do this so often



when we talk about God and religion; we make it so difficult when in reality the solutions are right in front of us. Over the years of my priesthood people have asked how they can become better Catholics. They think that the answer is found by studying about the church and learning more about its rules and regulations. This may help us better understand the Church, but it won't necessarily make us better Catholics. Today Jesus sums up in a very simple way what we need to do to better ourselves as people and as Catholics: "you shall love the Lord your God with all your hearts...and you shall love your neighbor as yourself." If we live by this, then we will have eternal life.

In reality what links us and our relationship to God, neighbor, and self is love. Sometimes we focus our attention so much on law that we absolutely forget about love. It is not being able to recite the law that is important; it is being able to relate the law to God's command of love. If we do that then we understand what it means to be a disciple. The Jewish people in the days of Jesus were so focused on knowing the law of their faith, but they did not understand what it meant to live the law. Today, we too can get caught up in just following laws without much thought. We somehow feel justified when we obey the commandments. Jesus however is reminding us that it is not as easy as just obeying a given law that counts, what really matters is how the laws we follow lead us to a deeper relationship with one another. For example, if I go to liturgy on Sunday simply because it is a law, am I really doing what is being asked of me? My reason for being at liturgy should be to share my presence and God's love with the people that are present. Again, we see that it is not about us; rather it is about us in relationship with God and the people in our world.

The commandments as well as the laws of our faith are to be simple; showing us how to be a child of God. Their purpose is much more than to give us a list of do's and don'ts in life. Their purpose is to help us realize that life is about relationship; ours to God and to one another. We cannot be attentive to one and at the same time ignore the other; they are connected. In linking love of God to love of neighbor, Jesus appears to want to remove morality and ethical behavior beyond the narrow, legalistic interpretation of religious practices which had crept into the Judaism of his time. The link between keeping the commandments and the nearness of God's kingdom is love of God, neighbor, self. Only then can we offer fitting sacrifice to God.
