Unity in God's Love

We all find some comfort in belonging, or fitting in someplace. Sometimes when we belong to something we have a tendency to become possessive which can lead to exclusivity. Whenever we feel comfortable belonging to a certain set of standards or be-



liefs, we begin to feel that we are right and everyone else is wrong. This is the scenario we find throughout our liturgy this week.

In our first reading the disciples or followers of Moses were threatened because there were people outside of their circle who received the Spirit of God and were able to prophecy. They couldn't imagine how anyone not belonging to their "group" would be given such a gift. We find the same situation in the gospel when the disciples of Jesus were upset because there were people working signs and wonders in Jesus' name. In both cases, Moses and Jesus were inclusive in their explanation; making it clear that God's goodness could not be confined within any boundaries, God's grace is given freely and not restricted to a small group.

It is this feeling of belonging that often leads to division in life. St. James in the second reading addresses how these divisions can lead to destruction. It is interesting that throughout his epistle there is very little reference to Jesus; rather he reflects the tradition of Jesus and his parables. James tries to help the reader to see both love of God and neighbor as necessary for covenant faith, and he places great emphasis on works. James warns us to watch out that our riches in life do not consume us by fostering a false sense of self-reliance and pride. Nor should we be tempted to forget the poor. This epistle breaks all barriers and reminds us of the importance of the moral life of the church.

Division and separation are a part of life; however we must be so very careful not to allow our divisions to shut us off from the message of Christ. We are all called to be tolerant and open to other people of good will. Many people in our world who do not even know Jesus share in the salvific mission of the universal savior. We are once again asked to be humble as children and not proud. We are encouraged to learn from the little ones who know how to trust, listen, learn and grow.

Jesus is close to us, not only in those who believe but in others, too, who love and care for us. Jesus tells us that God loves us even when we are stumbling blocks to that love. What Jesus is asking today, of his disciples and of us, is to remove anything that prevents us – or others – from seeing the love of God that is always there. Discipleship means doing something so great as

volunteering for one of the liturgical ministries or so simple as taking the garbage out without being asked. It means that our words and actions are consistent with Gospel values. It means that we are ruthless about choosing to cut out behaviors inconsistent with Jesus' values and gentle about choosing to do the works of the Teacher.
