Find Strength in God's Loving Presence.

Because of what we hear at our liturgy this week our thoughts turn to what it is we fear in life and more importantly, what we are to do about them. In the first reading Isaiah presents us with a poem that he delivered to the people of Israel right before the Assyrians threatened an attack



in Jerusalem. The people feared this foreign power and this fear was used as an advantage of the Assyrians to weaken the people. Isaiah tells them as he tells us: "Be strong, fear not! Here is your God..." When we realize and believe that the power of God is within us, we have nothing to fear.

Fear has a way of presenting itself in the most clandestine of ways. This week marks the anniversary of the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon. Our thoughts are carried back to that day when all of America as well as the world watched with fear and a feeling of helplessness as terrorism paralyzed us. As a nation we value power and materialism, to watch that being destroyed left our nation with a feeling of fear and helplessness. As we look back to that fateful day, the question we must ask ourselves is: what have we learned? How have our lives and values changed since that day?

Fear can be a powerful tool in controlling and manipulating how we live and think. We react from fear without much thought and it moves us into actions which might not be who we really are. We have many fears in life, and because of fear, societies break themselves into various class systems. We find ourselves in a certain station in life and that is, sad to say, where we often stay. St. James in the second reading reminds all of us that there should be no separations of people in our society. We should look at, and treat all people the same regardless of what their particular station in life might be, or how different they think or believe.

When we live out of fear we are often deaf and mute to the wrongs that are around us. We are afraid to speak out for fear that we might not be heard or worse, no one really cares to hear what we have to say. Jesus makes the man in the gospel well again. He went from living a life of fear from the darkness and isolation in his life to a world that became full of sounds and sight. He was given a rare opportunity to take a better look at life and what life has to offer.

We too have been given that same opportunity. With the salvation that Jesus brings to our world we are also made well. We should be able to look around and hear the wonderful creation God has given us. We should all have the courage to speak up for the many injustices we encounter on a daily basis. We should never permit fear to keep us from action. Jesus brings a new reality to our world. He makes real that creative power of

God to each of us. We need to live out our lives in such a way that we stop being blind, deaf and mute to the many injustices of life. We need to start looking at life and the people in it as all being equal in God's creative power. We are all being well advised to heed the words of Isaiah and not be frightened, rather be strong because our God is with us!


